Summary Statement

Our Commitment

Infratec and NewPower only purchase panels from suppliers who have a commitment to supply chains that are free from modern slavery.

Infratec and NewPower only buy panels from suppliers with a **stated commitment** to supply chains **free from modern slavery**. We have **contractual requirements** with suppliers to ensure that they have modern slavery policies and **third party auditing** and we require our suppliers to complete a questionnaire on modern slavery risks and cross-check their responses with leading research from external parties.

Background

Although the Aotearoa New Zealand Government has no official legislation on the transparent reporting of Modern-Day Slavery within the supply chain and what is being done to mitigate that risk, we do not believe that this issue should be ignored.

From our research, we know that information on upstream supply chains - including at the resource extraction level - is very limited and often unreliable, which poses a challenge to due diligence processes.

In 2021 we set up an ethical supply chain working group as a part of our Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) workstream to further qualify and de-risk exposure on a company level. We believe this issue requires industry wide collaboration, which is a part of our new Sustainability Strategy.

Other activities we have progressed include developing bespoke contracts that directly address the transparency around modern slavery supply chain concerns, exploring alternative and traceable supply chains, and alternative PV panel chemistries. We have also developed an internal ranking tool based on a supplier's likelihood of being associated with forced labour practices in their own supply chain.

Infratec aims to have transparent conversations with our clients about procurement options that consider modern-day slavery. These conversations and procurement options can be explored during the development phase.

What are the next steps?

We are in the process of **developing an externally facing modern slavery statement, along with a sustainable procurement policy**, both of which are expected to be finalised in early 2026.

The statement will align with the Australian modern Slavery Act 2018 and both documents will inform and guide our procurement practices.
